Lend your voice to Denver's Near Northwest Neighborhood Plan Initiative (NPI). This plan will help guide the city in answering the above questions and more.

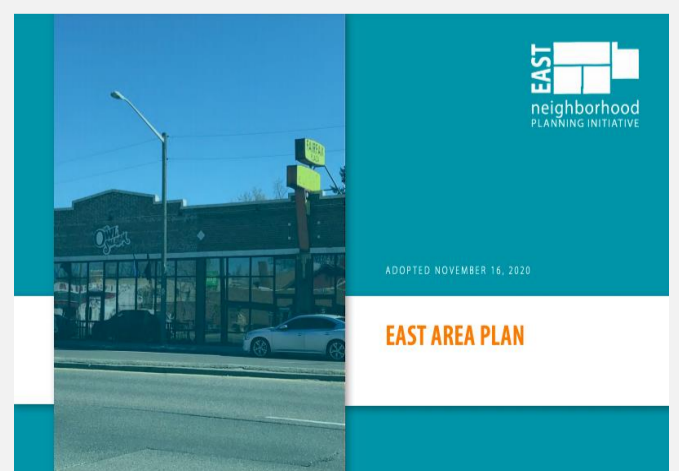
Think Big and Small

Denver has experienced tremendous growth the past decade, You may have heard about various citywide plans such as Blueprint Denver and the Comprehensive Plan 2040 that predicts how the city absorbs new growth and its changes in the in the future. While these plans set the vision, the NPIs are needed to fill in the finer details. The process take time and requires community input which is led by Denver's Community Planning and Development (CPD).

NPIs used to be for a singular neighborhood but in an effort to be more responsive to growth CPD is now grouping neighborhoods together and highlighting their similarities and weaknesses. The Near Northwest Plan Initiative will include Chaffee Park, Sunnyside, Highland, and Jefferson Park neighborhoods.

JPUN will have Naomi Grunditz from the office of Councilwoman Sandoval at our next General Membership (Virtual) Meeting on Feb 9, 6:30pm.

Naomi will discuss what a Neighborhood Area Plan (NAP) is and what it means to residents. She will talk about the recently adopted East Area Plan so residents can get a sense of what the end product of our planning process will look like. 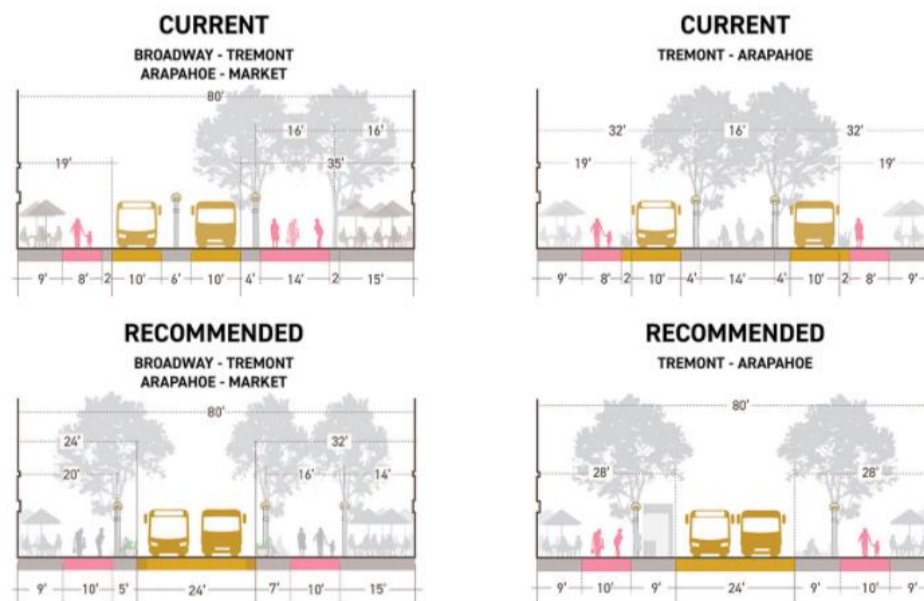


Denver to Recommend PCL Construction Services, Inc. to Design/Build the 16th Street Mall Improvement Project

The City and County of Denver has selected PCL Construction Services, Inc. as the design/build firm to carry out the [16th Street Mall Improvement Project](#). If the company is approved by Denver City Council the reconstruction of the Mall is likely to begin in late 2021 and be completed by the end of 2024.

A primary driver for the 16th Street Mall Improvement Project is the need to address deteriorating infrastructure that results in frequent disruptions to the transit system. Maintenance of the mall costs more than \$1M annually.

To honor the Mall’s iconic look, new granite pavers will be installed in a pattern similar to what’s on the Mall now, but with an improved drainage system and more surface friction to improve pedestrian safety. Visitors on foot will also benefit from 10 feet of dedicated, unobstructed sidewalk space on both sides of the Mall shuttle and adjacent to businesses.



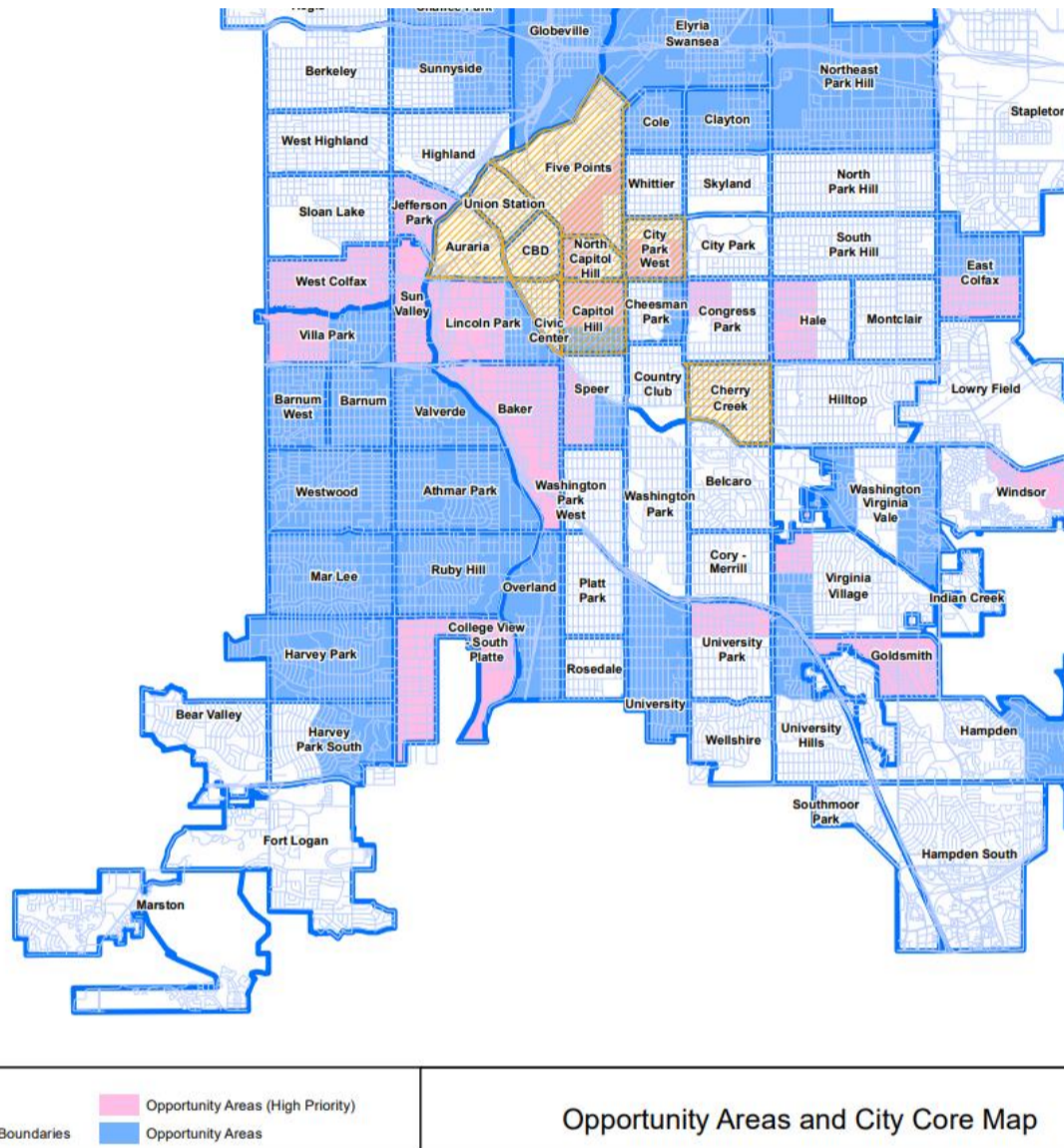

The Future of Denver’s Shared Bikes and Scooters

The days of the wild west for micromobility in Denver are just about to end. In a matter of days Denver’s Department of Transportation and Infrastructure (DOTI) will announce the one or two companies who will be allowed to operate their fleet of rental bikes and scooters. All others will have to ride out of town.

DOTI is discussing a mixture of dockless vehicles — untethered e-scooters, e-bikes and pedal bikes, unlocked with an app and tracked by GPS, that riders can dock around the city when they’re finished — and vehicles that people can find at stations, like the old B-cycle system. And unlike B-cycle, those stations might charge the electric scooters and bikes. This time around bikes are only expected to make up around 20% of the mobility mix with Lime, Lyft, Uber, Bird and Razor fighting for the Denver market.

The new bike-share and scooter-share system is part of [Denver’s Mobility Action Plan](#) to meet its sustainable transportation goals, which include bringing Denver’s solo driving commutes from around 70 percent (pre-pandemic) down to 50 percent by 2030.



Jefferson Park will be a High Priority Opportunity Area for Denver’s New Bike and Scooter Share Program.

Federal Boulevard Pipe Replacement

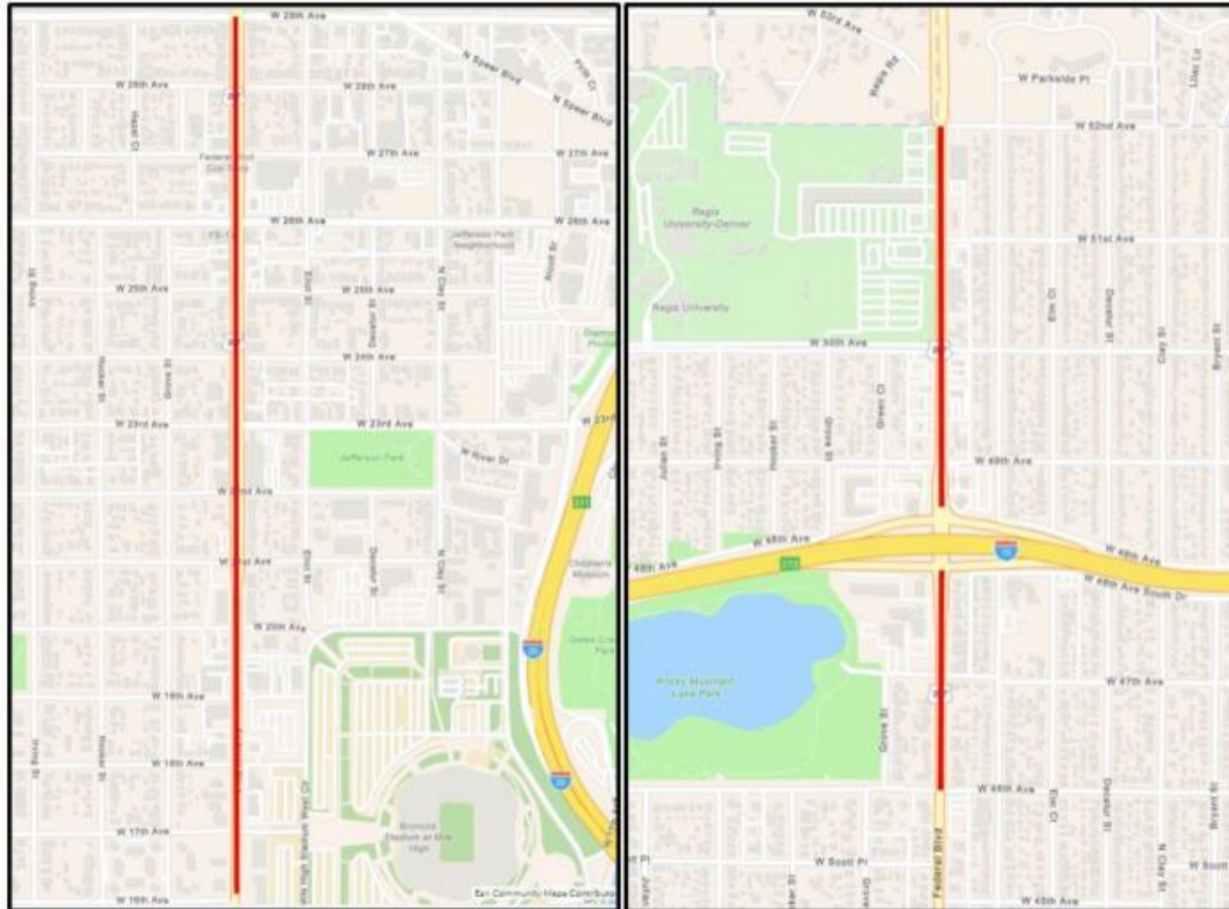
While it’s never a good time for road construction, the ability to have the project (new water lines and a smoother road) completed during a pandemic AND before summer is about as good as it could get.

Denver Water has started a water main replacement project on Federal Boulevard that will last until summer 2021. Working hours will typically be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday.

This project will occur in two locations on Federal Boulevard, with two crews working simultaneously to replace the aging water mains underneath the road:

- Federal Boulevard from West 16th Avenue to West 29th Avenue.
- Federal Boulevard from West 46th Avenue to West 52nd Avenue.

During construction, there will be daily lane closures on Federal Boulevard in these areas. Motorists should expect delays when traveling through the project areas. Local access to residences and businesses will be maintained throughout the project.

Denver Water will provide updates throughout the project via email and the social media platform Nextdoor. Residents and businesses in the construction zone will receive additional notifications with information about specific impacts they may experience.
