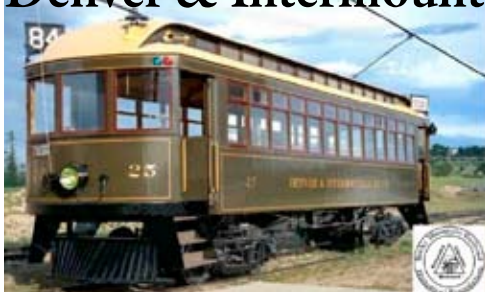

Jefferson Park United Neighbors

Denver & Intermountain Railroad Interurban No. 25



Denver once had an extensive electric rail transit system that included over 250 miles of city tracks

and 40 miles of high speed interurbans connected Denver with Golden and Boulder. Many thousands of riders used the system for accessing downtown Denver and its venues, for shopping, going to work and school, seeing friends and for recreation.

With the proliferation of the automobile and a new bus system, all trolley service was abandoned in 1950. Purchased by the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club to save it from destruction, No. 25 is the last remaining, completely intact, electric railway car out of over 250 that once served the Denver area and is listed on the State Register of Historic Properties.

Rich in local history, the car was built in 1911 by Denver's own Woeber Carriage Company and operated on the D&IM's 13 mile Denver - Lakewood - Golden line from 1911 to 1950. It seats 52 passengers and is electrically heated for all weather service. It is a rare survivor out of many thousands of intercity interurban cars that once served this country.

The Rocky Mountain Railroad Historical Foundation's members and supporters have contributed over 14,000 volunteer hours and over \$100,000 to restore No. 25 to its 1911 appearance. Authentic restoration and mechanical reliability are the hallmarks of this restoration. Its varnished oak interior, Edison light bulbs, brass fixtures and vintage, rattan seating takes its passengers back to a time in history that has been all but forgotten.

When completed, No. 25 will provide a fun, fascinating and educational glimpse into Denver's transit past for passengers of all ages. Providing a wonderful enhancement to Denver's cultural amenities, it could facilitate the Platte Valley Trolley service near downtown Denver with special events aboard the car including occasional livemusic and a variety of children's activities. Special thanks to Jefferson Park resident, Jerry Olson, for his contribution to preserving this valuable piece of history.

The DNC will be in Denver Monday August 25th-Thursday the 28th. Other cities who have held the DNC reported protest groups coming into town the weekend before, finding vacant houses or buildings, and camping out during the convention. If you see someone at a house or building you know to be vacant please call the Denver Police non emergency line 720-913-2000. Spear Blvd will only be open to traffic in front of the Pepsi Center 6am-9am. Auroria Pkwy to the east of the Pepsi Center will be closed at all times. The greatest impact we will see in our neighborhood will be Thursday the 28th when Democratic presidential candidate Barack Obama gives his speech at Invesco Field.

The Democratic National Convention and the on coming traffic delays

The DNC is upon us and whereas last month it seemed to be safely located on the other side of the Platte River, it now appears that the most important event of the convention, Barack Obama's acceptance of the Democratic nomination for President of the United States, will occur at Invesco Field at Mile High right here in Jefferson Park. So what does that mean for us? Well first of all it is a great opportunity for the Jefferson Park community to show the world its continuing progress towards becoming one of the premier Denver Neighborhoods. What else? Well most likely quite a few headaches for residents trying to drive home. Currently, all residents will have access to their homes, but this does not mean that there won't be complications.

Unfortunately, information concerning all of the closures and access the night of Obama's speech will not be announced until early August, which means you will have to watch the papers. However, the current street closures, protests, and parades affecting the Jefferson Park area between Aug. 25-28th are as follows:

PARADE ROUTE: Thursday, August 28

On Thursday, August 28, the Designated Parade Route to Invesco Field at Mile High will begin at 11:00 a.m. at the intersection of Mariposa Street and 13th Avenue and proceed northbound to Colfax Avenue. The route will

continue west on the westbound lanes of Colfax Avenue from Mariposa Street to Federal Boulevard. The route will continue on northbound Federal Boulevard from Colfax Avenue to no further north than 20th Avenue, where it will proceed east to the yet-to-be-finalized public viewing area, within sight and sound of the delegates.

Southbound Federal Boulevard – and one lane of northbound Federal Blvd. - will remain open during the parade. As is standard safety protocol for parade routes, prominent signage designating the route and traffic management/safety personnel along the route will be provided.

Parade-Related Street Impacts and Recommended Routes:

Colfax Ave. will remain open during morning rush hour, but will be closed from Mariposa Street to Federal Blvd. beginning at 9 a.m. on Thursday, August 28 until the Convention program concludes at Invesco on Thursday night. Westbound Colfax will be detoured to Kalamath Street. Eastbound Colfax will be detoured at southbound Federal Blvd.

One northbound Federal Boulevard traffic lane – from Colfax Avenue to 20th Avenue – will close at 9 a.m. and reopen at 3 p.m.. One northbound lane of Federal Boulevard – and all of southbound Federal Blvd. - will remain open throughout the parade
NORTHWEST: Travelers can use I-25 to Park Ave West or 20th Street to access downtown. Traffic exiting downtown to the northwest should use 20th Street or Park Avenue to I-25. According to the Denver Post "Given that the August 28 venue change from the Pepsi Center to Invesco Field at Mile High was just announced on July 7, roadway impacts - and recommended alternative routes - for Thursday of

Convention week have not yet been finalized and will be announced by early August.

Perhaps the largest problem for Jefferson Park at this point will be the 15th street closure, beginning at Little Raven, which will be ongoing for the duration of the convention. This will necessitate the use of the highway and Park Avenue for car traffic. Foot traffic will be allowed.
